Scientific Name:	Puma concolor
A.K.A.:	Puma, mountain lion, cougar, catamount
Range:	CanadianYukon to Southern Andes Mountains
Length:	Nose to Tail Adult Male 7.9 ft., Adult Female 6.7 ft.
Weight:	Adult Males – 115-220 lbs., Adult Females – 64-141 lbs.
Litter Size:	One to six cubs
Size:	4 th largest cat predator
Habitat:	Dense underbrush and rocky terrain; territorial & solitary
Hunting Style:	Nocturnal stalk & ambush
Running Speed:	40-50 MPH
Leaping Ability:	18 ft. vertically and 40-45 ft. horizontally
Normal Prey:	(Largest) deer, elk, moose, big horn sheep (Smallest) rodents
Predators:	Jaguars, black bears, wolves, and grizzly bears
DNA:	More closely related to house cats than lions
Fun Facts:	Mountain lions are not true lions and cannot roar; they hold the Guinness
	record for animal with the most names – with over 40 names in English
	alone; Proportionally they have the largest hind legs in the cat family.
