You can also participate in a wide variety of classes and workshops including oil painting, nature journaling, mixed media and photography.

Experienced, professional artists provide individual instruction in the classroom setting located in the museum's Baldwin Education Building. Whether you sample a few classes or complete the certificate program, you will increase your appreciation and knowledge of the desert!

REQUIRED COURSES

The following courses are required if you wish to receive a Certificate of Completion in Nature Art and the recommended sequence of courses may vary per individual. If you enroll with previous experience you may schedule a portfolio appointment with the Director for the possibility of waiving core classes. Core classes waived due to proven ability may be replaced with electives. Most courses consist of exercises, critiques, demonstrations and homework assignments.
